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1. THE SOCIETY AND ITS MEMBERSHIP

THE SOCIETY'S MEMBERSHIP NUMBERS ARE PRESENTED in Table I, where the membership is classified according to institutional membership and individual membership. The number of institutional members has continued to decline. Individual membership has been stable over the past ten years; it has picked up this year, perhaps as a consequence of the World Congress.

Table II displays the division between print and online and online only memberships and subscriptions. Since the choice between these two alternatives was offered in 2004, there has been a continued shift toward online only.

Table III compares the Society's membership and the number of institutional subscribers with those of the American Economic Association. (For the membership category these figures include ordinary, student, free, and life members for both the ES and the AEA.) The ES/AEA ratio had been increasing, reaching a peak of 35.9 percent in 2010. Since then, the ratio has declined to 28.2%. The ratio for institutional members has increased this year, mainly because the AEA institutional membership dropped sharply.

The geographic distribution of ordinary and student members by countries and regions as of June 30 of the current and selected previous years is shown in Table IV. The table shows individual data on countries with more than 10 members in 2010. Membership increased in the United Kingdom and Canada, and especially in China, India, and the new African region. It decreased in Australia and in Japan. Total membership increased by 0.6%.

Table V shows the percentage distribution of ordinary and student members by regions as of June 30 of the current and selected previous years. Like last year, the shares of Europe and North America in total membership increased, to a total of 77.6%. The share of Australasia fell and that of Africa increased.

Finally, Table VI presents the percentage distribution of institutional subscribers by regions as of June 30 of the current and the previous four years. It shows that the decline in institutional membership over the past few years is mostly imputable to the European region.

2. Fellows

Table VII displays the geographic distribution of Fellows as of June 30, 2015. Two-thirds of the Fellows are based in the United States, and 20% in the European Union.

GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION OF FELLOWS, 2015

Table VIII provides information on the nomination and election of Fellows. Since 2006, the election has been conducted with an electronic ballot system. This has led to a very significant increase in the participation rate. This trend was interrupted in 2014: of 455 Active Fellows, only 320 voted in the election. While participation had reached record levels in 2012 and then in 2013, the 70% participation rate this year is close to a ten-year low.

Elections in 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2010 were conducted under the "one click" arrangement where Fellows had the option of ticking a box that would result in placing initially a tick for all the candidates put forward by the Nominating Committee. This "one click" arrangement was abandoned in 2011. Instead, the candidates nominated by the Committee appeared with "N" next to their names, indicating that they were proposed by the Nominating Committee.

Only 52 nominations were received in 2014. 42 were nominated by Fellows, of whom 6 were elected; and 10 by the Nominating Committee, with 8 elected. These numbers are lower than those recorded in 2013. Just like last year, only one new Fellow was elected from regions other than Europe or North America.

The Council of the Society voted this Spring to modify the nomination procedure slightly: Candidates not elected, who received 20% of votes from the

previous year's election will automatically be on the ballot, with a cap of 3 years total on the ballot.

3. MEETINGS

In 2015 the Society is holding its 11th World Congress in Montréal, Canada from August 17 to August 21. As in every World Congress year, no full-scale regional meetings are organized.

The North American Winter Meetings have traditionally taken place within the meetings of the Allied Social Sciences Association (ASSA). In addition, the Africa region organized a training workshop in Lusaka, Zambia in July; and the third Summer School on economic theory took place in Tokyo, Japan in August. Finally, the European Winter meeting will be organized in Milan in December.
